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From the Pastor

What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God.

Micah 6:8

Dear Friends,

We have a little ongoing joke in my house that surfaces every once in awhile over the weekend. My husband will ask, "What are you going to preach about on Sunday?" And I will respond, "God." He will then ask, "What are you going to say about God?" And I will say, "God is good." Sometimes the joke stops there and sometimes it has a second section which continues with him asking, "Are you going to preach about anything else?" I reply, "Sin." And he asks, "What about sin?" I say, "Sin is bad." And it ends with Darryl saying, "You always preach about the same thing."

While I do preach about different things, our family joke does address the truth that there are several essential beliefs that are repeated in the Bible. Our passage above from Micah 6:8 echoes the law to love God we find in Deuteronomy 6 (and elsewhere in the Old Testament) and the law to love others we find in Leviticus 19 (again, and elsewhere in the Old Testament). Jesus says that love is the greatest commandment - loving God with your entire being and loving your neighbor as yourself. Paul and others repeat the importance of love throughout the New Testament letters. Love was part of the Methodist movement when John Wesley taught that our faith is expressed in works of piety (loving God) and works of mercy (loving neighbor). And this call to love is implicit in our own mission statement at First UMC, Christ our Life (loving God) and Service our Lifestyle (loving neighbor).

Since Valentine's day is this month, it seems like a good time to remind ourselves that love, in the Biblical understanding, is not

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merely a sentiment but a call to action. Love is expressed in acts of devotion to God and acts of kindness to one another. Love does the hard work of showing up, holding a hand when someone is scared, intervening when there is injustice, and being faithful even in the face of despair.

It may seem like a long time ago when you filled out your commitment to ministry and pledge card in the fall but this is the first time I have written in the newsletter since you did. When you turned those cards in as an act of worship, you were making a commitment to love in action. For some of these commitments, you may have already been contacted by someone or invited to an upcoming training event (see page 5) But for some of these commitments the follow up will consist of you showing up with one another to the faithful expressions of Christian life: attending worship, studying the Bible, praying and doing daily devotions, practicing intentional acts of kindness to our neighbors, and reaching out in love.

Reaching out in love – that is what God does for us in Jesus Christ, over and over again. Thanks be to God.

May we, in turn, do the same.

Our church is hosting SHALOM the week of March 2-8th. While our church is the site for "intake" each day of SHALOM during the winter months., when we host, our church will be responsible for feeding and caring for the guests during this week. Due to the



large number of guests we will be housing them at Tytus Ave. Church of God. This is the last week of SHALOM and it is often a stressful time for both the guests (whom may not have successfully found housing for the Spring and beyond) and the core volunteers whom have spent weeks and countless hours on paperwork, van driving, logistics, and are experiencing physical/mental/emotional fatigue.

It CANNOT be overstated that volunteers are desperately needed. Volunteers to make meals are usually the first to fill up. What is harder to find are people who are willing and are physically able to spend the night. There are also opportunities to be a "host" during the hours between dinner and bedtime, where you can interact with the guests, play cards, games, or just be a listening ear. These last 2 volunteer options, while the most difficult, offer the strongest opportunities for gratitude and humbleness for what God has given us. It's also a wonderful opportunity to share this experience of compassion with a young person in your life. Please talk to Steve Swank if you have any questions. "Shining in the darkness"

Matthew 5:15-16

In the Sermon of the Mount, Jesus taught about the Christian path and described a Christian attitude towards others. He also told the people around him about their responsibility to their community when they become disciples of Him.

As disciples, they must love God, and their neighbors as themselves. They must love their enemies, pray for their prosecutors, and bless those who curse them. Also, they must be the salt of the earth, and the light of the world.

The Christian disciples are the salt of the earth because they keep everything in good shape, giving taste to the culture, morality, and justice. The Christian disciples are the light of this world because they light the world with their shining lights of love, justice, and peace, showing others their good works so everybody praise God.

As Christ's disciples, we are called to shine in the dark. We are not called to hide our light nor put it beneath a table, we are called to let it shine to help others to find the way to God.

How can we shine in this dark time? By loving our neighbor, no matter how different they are, no matter what the politicians say against them. Jesus' calling is to shine in the darkness, even when my neighbor does not look like me or think like me.

I appreciate doing ministry within a church. As a United Methodist Church, we are shining by bringing some light on despair, injustice, and fear. We are people who never hide their light but let that light shine brighter.

These past months, at the Legal Clinic hosted here in our church we have been planning and working on a conference that provides some resources about legal assistance for immigrants. We know things are going to get rough for every person who is looking for a better future for their families and loved ones. The whole team, therefore, prepared some strategies to help all folks that need some assistance, guidelines, and advice in this unclear path. By doing this, we want to let our community know that we are here ready to help, and ready to provide all the assistance as best as we can.

As Christ's disciples, we are letting our light shine in the darkness.

"No one lights a lamp and then puts it under a basket. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your good deeds shine out for all to see so that everyone will praise your heavenly Father" Matthew 5:15-16

An update from Dr. Les and Debbie Dornon, missionaries to Nepal working in the Tansen Hospital

We have been enjoying a string of beautiful days here in Tansen – every morning the colors in the sky are spectacular, and the Himalayan mountains are clear and amazing. We sit in the sun to eat our lunch and enjoy looking at the snow-covered peaks. Unfortunately, some of those peaks have much less snow than usual – we ask for prayers for rain and snow to offset the dry season that will be coming soon.

Some of you have read that we had a wonderful celebration of Rachel and Scott's wedding in Las Vegas at the end of December. We were so thankful to be able to be there to share in their joy. We arrived back in Tansen on Jan 3, and started into work on the 5th. It was a bit of a struggle working through the jetlag, but we made it! It doesn't seem to get easier as we age... Les is back to seeing patients and doing training sessions, and Debbie is working on helping to put together the Friends of Tansen magazine, welcoming and sorting new Medical students, and preparing housing for new volunteers coming into the project. We are thankful we have been healthy and are able to do what God puts before us each day.

We have been praying for the Los Angeles area and an end to the fires and drought there. We would also ask that you join us in prayer for a family who just suffered a major loss... Friends of ours who served in Nepal lost their son-in-law in a terrible accident. He and his wife were serving with MAF in Northern Australia. She is left with 3 children, ages 7, 5 and 2. We can't even imagine.

Finally, we are getting ready to do a "virtual itineration" on Thursday, Feb 6 at 8 pm Eastern time. We will do a short presentation of some of what is happening here in Tansen.
