Dear Friends.

Observing the Rests, Mary Ellen Clinard, Worship Director

One of my favorite musical jobs is to play for junior high and high school students for the Ohio Music Educator Association's Solo and Ensemble Contest every year. This is a voluntary effort by the student who chooses to "go the extra mile" and learn a solo piece to play in front of a judge on a specific day in January. With the guidance of the teacher, the student selects a piece and works on it independently or during private lessons. Once the notes are learned by the student, they bring in the accompanist (me) to complete the performance. In most of these pieces, the piano is playing an orchestral "reduction", which means the piano part is playing all the orchestra parts and the student's solo instrument has the starring role.

One of the hardest things for the student to learn is "resting". In their practice they have learned one section and then go on to the next section, etc., without any thought as to what is happening when there are rests in their measures and not notes. When I come in to accompany them, they often barrel through the music and I have to jump ahead to catch up. What I try to teach them in this beginning time of collaboration, is that those rests are there for a reason. Sometimes it's so the soloist and the orchestra (or piano) can create a dialogue of music. First one speaks, then another. But another less obvious reason is so that the soloist can "take a breather". Playing any kind of woodwind, reed, or brass instrument can make your lips go weak and numb. With those measures of rest, the soloist has a chance to rest their body before they go on to the next phrase. The listener also gets a break from it all sounding the same. It creates interest, dialogue, and physical renewal.

Pastor Kim is planning a Lenten Series about "Rest" and is using some musical examples throughout the season. I am excited about planning and creating many rest-filled opportunities through the music for this upcoming few weeks!

Lenten Offering

As has become our tradition, our Lenten and Easter offering this year will focus on the ministries of our church that focus on feeding our neighbors. We have a weekly **food pantry** that is open every Tuesday afternoon. We also offer pantry items in the form of **emergency food**, which is a grocery bag full of canned goods, peanut butter, crackers, etc. Last, but certainly not least, we host Monday morning **Breakfast Club** which provides a hot breakfast to anyone who comes.

This Lenten season you are invited to purchase pantry items that are the quickest to leave our pantry shelves. These items are:

Toilet tissue (4 pack) White Rice (3 lb bag)

Laundry detergent Shampoo (V05)

Dish soap Apple Juice—Half Gallon

Vegetable/Canola Oil Evaporated Milk Flour Paper Towels

Sugar Ramen Noodles (Chicken/Beef)

Salt Bar Soap Ivory/Zest

Vienna Sausages

In addition to purchasing items for the pantry, prayerfully consider how you can be involved with these ministries year-round. Could you volunteer to serve during pantry hours or be a shopper for food pantry items that do not get donated? Or could you come to the church on Monday mornings to make a hot breakfast for our neighbors?

A Note from Rev. Daniel Cardenas, Associate Pastor

"I am only a foreigner" Ruth 2:10

Ruth couldn't expect kindness and caring from anyone in Israel because she was a foreign woman, but Boaz was such an amazing man. He allowed Ruth to work in his fields picking up some food for her and her mother-in-law. He let Ruth drink water from his well and invited her to sit with him and his workers at his table.

Boaz was so welcoming and kind to Ruth. He didn't look at Ruth differently just because she was a foreign woman, instead, he was caring and supportive of her.

In the same way, as Christians, we are called to be caring and welcoming of the immigrant and the foreigner. We are called to be such an example of kindness and love to those who are coming to get better chances to provide, to care, and to give to their families.

We are called to love our neighbor in all the possible ways we can.

Following our calling to love each other, the Immigration Legal Clinic, hosted by our church, provided a workshop for local leaders to give them tools to improve their ministries, offering the chance to know people's rights within these harmful and difficult times.

The lawyers who usually help every month in the Immigration Legal Clinic spoke to the attendees about how to respond to Immigration & Customs Enforcement and what rights the immigrants have. They also showed how to choose a power of attorney for finances, properties, and money. They talked about how to make a power of attorney for your children in case the worst happens.

A variety of leaders attended our February meeting: leaders from Hispanic communities around the area, pastors of churches with members who are immigrants, people interested in supporting our society, and the Chief of the Middletown Police Department. Everyone was so interested and proactive in this initiative to help our immigrant communities.

The next step is having another session with current clients who may need help with their power of attorney and paperwork.

Please continue praying and supporting this wonderful and amazing ministry toward our neighbors Rev. Daniel Cardenas.

Church Finances

On Sunday, February 23rd Pastor Kim held an informational meeting about our church's current financial situation. While we received more pledges (72) and for a larger amount (\$280,918) we are still anticipating a deficit for 2025. It looks like our expenses for 2025 will be greater than our projected giving by the amount of \$114,645.

We are planning to meet this deficit in three ways. One, we are transferring money from an investment in the amount of \$28,000. Two, Pastor Kim has applied for District and Conference grants but it is uncertain if we will receive these and what amount we will be rewarded. Lastly, the congregation will be asked to make a second mile gift – a gift in addition to what is already been pledged, to help us meet the shortfall. (See article on page 5.) And you are always welcome to request the current Treasurer's report which has our monthly giving, our expenses, and the balances of all of our checking accounts.

An update from Dr. Les and Debbie Dornon, missionaries to Nepal working in the Tansen Hospital

"Two for One"

One day, a man came into the hospital emergency room with a bad fracture as he had fallen while walking home from a local shop. Unfortunately, two months previously, he had fallen and broken the same leg! He had had surgery in our hospital at that time, and was healing only to fall and cause a break in the same place again.

He has had a difficult life - his first wife left him, and he couldn't go to India to work and take care of his children, so he married again. He had been sending money to his family from India...until he fell and could no longer work. The family live in an old house belonging to an uncle, they have no land, and are dependent on the daily wages that the father used to bring in. They owe much money from a previous loan they had to take. So when he fell this second time, he didn't want to have to pay more money and just wanted a cast put on his leg. However, he was assured here at the hospital that we could help with the costs and the orthopedic surgeons could do a better repair with surgery.

While he was talking with the orthopedic doctor, he mentioned that his daughter had fallen and hurt her arm, and even in a cast, it was still very painful after several weeks. The surgeon asked for a picture of the x-ray, and it was sent to him on his phone! (Yes - technology continues to advance here!) He encouraged the dad to bring his daughter here as well - so he did! Both father and daughter were operated on, and because of their financial difficulties, the hospital was able to pay for that for them. This was due to the generous gifts from friends around the world funding the Medical Assistance Fund. We are so thankful that we never have to turn anyone away who cannot pay.
