From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

I have been thinking about the story of the healing of the paralyzed man in Mark 2. This is the story where, because of the crowds, the friends who were carrying the paralyzed man ended up digging a hole in the roof and lowering their friend before Jesus. I used this story in celebrating the life of Doc Burley but it has continued to swirl through my mind. And I know why.

Throughout my ministry, I have consistently identified with the friends tearing off the roof but now as I face knee replacement surgery, I have suddenly become the man on the mat – needing the support of others for my healing to happen. A close friend is coming to stay with me for a few days, my husband and daughter are taking over responsibilities that have been mostly mine to shoulder, our amazing staff is stepping forward to fill in the gap during my recovery. All of these people giving of themselves is humbling.

It is one thing to preach a worship series on One Another and teach about how we need each other, but it is much harder to live out that truth primarily as the receiver of support rather than the giver of support. But this humbling experience reminds me of truths that I know from the Bible: we are the body of Christ. Each one of us has a part and each of us work together to live the ministry of Jesus here at First UMC in Middletown, OH. Each one of us has a part and no part is any more important or less important that any other. It does not matter if we are on the mat or carrying the mat. We work together or we do not work at all.

I will miss you while I am gone but please know that I am keeping you in my prayers. I'm so grateful that we are on this journey together. Blessings!








A New Worship Series Easter: An Opportunity to Bloom

Easter Thanks!

One of my favorite times of the year is preparing for Holy Week and Easter Sunday. As we move through the narrative of the events of Jesus' last week on earth, so many changes take place in the sanctuary. On Good Friday, we drape the large cross with black, the communion table is bare with the exception of candles. The music is somber and quiet.

Then on Saturday, excitement starts to build, the Worship Committee arrives early in the morning and the flowers are delivered. For the last few year, Roger Conner, owner of Flowers by Roger, and the business where we order our Easter flowers, pays us a visit along with the arrival of the flower delivery. He suffered a debilitating stroke, and other health issues a few years ago, and his presence is always appreciated and anticipated. The flowers are arranged, there are flowers in the windows, the black cloth is removed and white netting now drapes the cross. Brass altarware---cross, candlesticks and vases, are returned, bright white cloths adorn the table and podium, and the offering plates are switched from wood to brass. The banners are prepared for the processional. Each year, I think about the people in Jesus' life in that day between his death and resurrection. They didn't know what to expect, or what was about to happen. How blessed we are to be able to anticipate the joy of resurrection even before Easter. We believe it happened and will CONTINUE to happen! Thanks to all the congregation members who help make this visual transformation possible each year!

John 16:33

An update from Dr. Les and Debbie Dornon, missionaries to Nepal working in the Tansen Hospital

Greetings from another part of the world! We are writing this while enjoying a visit with our precious, new granddaughter in England. Not only are we loving the snuggles with baby girl, but we are also having fun catching up with Hannah and Nathan. They are happy we brought along a string of sunny days so we have been trying out the fancy new pram (stroller!).

Life in Tansen continues on and we have had a series of farewells recently. Comings and goings are quite common among the missionary community, but recently, we said goodbye to a wonderful Nepali Christian family who had been 10 years in Tansen. They were leaders not only in the hospital but also in the church and community. They will be very missed, but we know they will be greatly used in their new home (still in Nepal!) We also just had an all-too-common tragedy – a man who works at the lab in the hospital was up in a tree (picking fruit) when he fell. He broke his back and 3 ribs and was helicoptered into Kathmandu for treatment. It seems likely that if he survives, he will be a paraplegic, which is difficult anywhere, but especially in a country like Nepal. Ironically, UMN (United Mission to Nepal) is having a campaign to raise funds to help disabled people in our area. If you are interested, here is a link with information about that.

Annual Conference


The 56th session of the West Ohio Conference will be held May 28 through May 31 at Capital University in Bexley. This will be the first Ohio Episcopal Area annual conference in which Bishop Hee-Soo Jung presides. The theme for this year's session is *Rise Up, Beloved: Trust in God's Promises* based on the scripture from Mark 5:35-43.

Annual Conference is the decision making body of our geographical area. At Annual Conference, the Bishop's mission focus is established, there's teaching by guest bishops and leaders, and worship is offered. Retirees are honored and new clergy are commissioned or ordained, and business sessions where recommendations that have been sent to the conference in advance are taken up for consideration.
