Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Through our worship series that started in May, we have been exploring the meaning of the opportunities that we have to bloom. We have seen that sometimes our life could be full of struggles and distress, but that does not mean that is the end. Naomi is an example of that. She went to another place wealthy and blessed. There, everything turned dark and confusing. She lost her husband and her two only sons. She was devastated, so she thought, "This is the end for me," but God had another plan for her. After she grieved her loss, she decided to go back to her homeland, but now she was taveling with her daughters-in-law, Ruth and Orpha. Orpha went back to her family and her gods, but Ruth decided to stay side-by-side with Naomi and be her companion. Naomi believed it was the end because she felt empty and lonely, but God provided Ruth's company. Ruth was like a daughter to her. Everything was lost for Naomi.

Sometimes, we face problems, distress, and losses, but that does not mean the end of it. That's the idea that the Apostle Paul had in mind when he wrote to the Philippians. Paul knew that sometimes we are not feeling well at all. Sometimes we feel like there is no hope, nor motivation, nor joy; but that does not mean that is the end for us, or for our faith. Paul tried to let the Philippians know that even in those bad days, we can keep pressing on to make it happen; he wanted to them know there is a light at the end of the tunnel: the promise of God working through Jesus Christ to make us more

Pentecost Sunday June 8th



Having grown up as a Methodist, I take for granted that everyone surely knows the reason we celebrate Pentecost. But here at First Church, we have been blessed by members of our congregation who come from other religious backgrounds, or are perhaps new to the faith. For those familiar with Pentecost, continue to dig in your closet for something red to wear on June 8 while I take a moment to explain to those new to Pentecost what all the excitement is about!

The word "Pentecost" is rooted in the word fifty. This represents the 50 day period after Easter. This 50 day celebration is also important to the Jewish faith as they celebrate the important festival of Shavuoth that occurs 50 days after Passover. (This will be important later!)

The story of Pentecost is found in the second chapter of Acts in the New Testament. The apostles had gathered together to celebrate Shavuoth as were throngs of people from all over the land. There were Jews, of course, and I imagine like any large festival today, there were also vendors selling food, offerings, and trinkets, who were of other faiths or maybe no faith at all. As the disciples gathered, they heard the rush of a mighty wind and tongues of fire appeared above each of their heads and they were filled with the Holy Spirit and were given the ability to speak in other languages. So with the ability to speak in all of the languages of the people who were attending the Festival, the disciples went out and spread the word about Jesus. In Acts 2:41, it says that three thousand people were baptized as a result!!

Because of this outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and the gifts of communication given to the disciples, this is considered the first "church". Therefore, Pentecost is considered the birthday of the church.

We wear red to symbolize the "tongues of fire" that were given to the disciples on that day. The large cross in the sanctuary will be draped with a dramatic red cloth. Sometimes we have congregation members who speak other languages read portions of the scripture. It's an exciting day that reminds us that we, too, have been commissioned to go out and spread the word of Jesus. Wearing red is just the beginning!!

MISSION MOMENT

An update from Dr. Les and Debbie Dornon, missionaries to Nepal working in the Tansen Hospital

The new post-partum maternity ward was finished and had an official opening. Now we just need more patients to fill it up! We continue to struggle with lower patient numbers due to the failure of the govt. insurance scheme. Looking for new ways to bring in patients, Les has started a once a week "general appointment clinic" (GAC) where people can book a time to meet with him for their exam and tests. Every Tuesday he has what we teasingly refer to as the "Great American Clinic". Many years ago, patients would frequently come asking to see the "American" doctor and some of our missionary colleagues from countries like U.K., Australia, Canada and other European countries threatened to go drink tea while Les saw all the patients! (At the time he was the only American in the project).

The annual Hospital "marathon" (actually about 7 km) happened again this year. I walked with a group of other non-runners, and Les came in 6th overall – but 1st in the over 60's division.

We celebrated the opening of the waste water treatment plant after many years and many struggles! We are thankful to have cleaned up the hillside significantly for future generations.

At the hospital "bhoj" (feast/celebration) Les and I were honored with a certificate for our 25 years of service here. There was a 10 year gap in the middle, but it was nice to be recognized. We were also pleased to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Tansen School of Health Science, a school for nurses and lab technicians. It is wonderful to see all the bright young people studying to serve others in the medical professions when just 70 years ago there were none!

Finally, we are very thankful to have learned that our CT scanner has been fully funded! We are now

in the process of purchasing an appropriate machine and preparing a room for it in the hospital. This was such a huge answer to prayer.

We are coming to the end of our time here in Tansen – we plan to return to the U.S. in late October. We will spend several months visiting churches, and have been or will be in touch about that. Then we will retire from Global Ministries.

We pray that we will finish well – and that those who are staying here and coming after us will find that we have been faithful in our service.

And we pray for you – we are so thankful for your support and prayers over these many years. We pray if you don't already, that you would come to know the grace and peace that can come only through faith in Jesus. He alone has seen us through the good and the bad, and we are thankful.
